What is phonics?

Sounds

This is the smallest unit of sound in a word and the sound that letter or group of sounds make Graphemes

The written representation of a phoneme.

A phoneme you hear



A grapheme you see





English alphabetic code

- 44 sounds
- 26 letters
- Over 150+ graphemes (letter combinations)

One of the most complex alphabetic codes in the world.




Speed Sounds Set 1























































Sounds + blending = reading

Fred Talk routine

- 1. Say the word in sounds as Fred e.g. c-a-t.
- 2. Ask your child to repeat. Can they 'jump-in' with the whole word?
- 3. Say the word in sounds followed by the whole word e.g. c-a-t, cat
- 4. Ask your child to repeat




