If you are worried about a child's safety, please do not hesitate to contact the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) or Designated Safeguarding Officers (DSOs).

If a child is in **immediate danger**, call the **POLICE on 999**

During anti-bullying week, our Guardian Angels planned and delivered an assembly with the staff from COMPASS on how we must choose respect and what respect looks like at St. Mark's. Our anti-bullying motto is:

For those of you who may have children with **peanut allergies**, please read the recent guidance from Allergy UK: <u>https://www.allergyuk.org/news/peanut</u> <u>-statement/</u>

It states that some products containing mustard powder may contain peanuts. The Food Standards Agency has listed products it is recalling (please check as some of these products can be purchased in your local supermarket). *No food products in our school kitchen are listed and no food contains mustard powder.* We welcome community police officers regularly into school as it is important to develop the children's understanding of the role the police play in helping to keep our local community safe.

PC Malley visited our school on the 28th November to discuss the importance of the role the police play in upholding our protected characteristics with our Y6 children. They were respectful and really understood the importance of this and how it links to our values.

Mrs. Hussain and Mrs. Linley monitor punctuality and attendance on a regular basis in school.

We identify trends and issues and ensure that we take early action to prevent an issue becoming worse.

This term, we have sent letters to **9** families whereby we have identified persistent punctuality issues. Any families needing further support to improve punctuality need to arrange a meeting with Mrs. Linley.

Please contact her directly via Class Dojo messaging. As a school we aim to support our parents with attendance and punctuality.

Our current attendance figure for this point in the year is: 94.8%

Our whole school target for attendance is 97% for the year.

Senior leaders have conducted **7** unannounced home visits this term. Please communicate with school staff if you require further support to ensure your child's attendance is the best it can be.

Punctuality

The school gates open at 8.30am and close at 8.45am. Lessons start at 8.55am so children need to be in class before this time to ensure they are well prepared to start their morning lesson. Any child arriving after 8.45am will need to be signed in by a parent on the signage system and your child will receive a late mark.

Being on time is a good thing

- Gets the day off to a good start with everyone in a positive frame of mind.
- Helps your child make the most of their learning and sets positive patterns for the future.
- Helps children develop a sense of responsibility both for themselves and for others
- Helps your child make and keep friends.
- Improves self-confidence.

The impact of being late

- Gets the day off to a bad start and can put you in a mood.
- Can be embarrassing
- May damage your child's confidence.
- Children miss vital information at the start of the day.
- Disrupts the learning.

Procedures on Reporting a Child's Absence

If your child is ill and unable to attend school, please contact the school office on 0121 357 9892 before 8.30am. The school answering machine will pick your message up and please following the instructions for reporting your child's absence. A phone call needs to be made to the school office every day that your child is absent from school.

If we have not heard from a parent by 10.00am as to why their child is absent from school, Mrs. Hussain will ring all of the contact numbers registered for that child until contact is made.
